Tom McNeil motioned for Bryan Mayo to be vice president serving under Matt Quinn beginning Jan. 1st.

Treasurers & Secretary Report - Heidi Watson - Ending Balance of \$55,113.90

NCTA membership dues were paid two weeks prior-114 members paid for 119 members.

Ryan - asked about the Fall meeting. We profited \$570 from the fall meeting.

Tom asked a question about the website and seedlings' income. Corrections were made, and updated reports were sent to directors.

Heidi - looking for input on late membership payments and also folks joining late in the fall. Discussion around the bylaws, and got another updated version with answers to these questions.

Meetings Committee - Ryan

Pesticide credits will be offered at the winter meeting.

Fall Meeting - We are looking for a 2025 host farm in the central or northern Maine area. The 2024 Fall meeting was a success!

Fryburg Fair - Gary Fisher & Ryan read the report Gary and Melba wrote (see Fryeburg Fair Report later in this newsletter).

Gary has 200 seedlings left over from the seedling sale. Discussion over the best way to care for them over the winter and how to sell them. Also, discussion on the rising cost of seedlings from the grower.

Discussion over judging and more specifics on what the judges are looking for.

Thank you from Ryan on behalf of the board to Melba and Gary Fisher for all of their work on the Fryeburg Fair.

AgCom - Working with the legislature, 70 representatives went on a bus ride to about 6/7 different farms in Maine. It's done every two years.

Scholarship Committee - Received two applications from qualified applicants. Upon full application review verification is likely to award each applicant a \$1000.00 scholarship. Awaiting the Fryeburg Fair Results for Scholarship fund accounting.

Trees for Troops - Rob sent a text, continuing to work with Trees for Troop folks on a time and date for the actual load-up. As of October 13th, we were 55 trees short. Ryan would be happy to pick up trees in southern Maine and bring them to the location. Please just reach out and we can help with transportation.

Tom requested we add the need for Trees for Trees for Troops to an email blast.

Minutes of the Board of Directors Meeting - October 14th, 2024 (continued)

Seed Orchard - In place for the winter 2 years of grafted "37" needle retention seed clones to plant out in the new seed orchard in Hartland for next year. "35" pooted rootstock to be grafted spring of '25. Calvin said in July marked out 8 rows of the orchard 25' apart with 8 tree locations per row 20' apart all flagged with bright Red flags. Ron Lemen sprayed a 4' square of around each of the flagged locations with glyphosate and simazine to kill the grass. Returned 3 weeks later to see a good kill of grass and weeds, total cost was \$250.00. Matt Quinn brought a mower up after the fall meeting cost \$140.00.

Old Business -

During the Fall Meeting, we discovered we've been working from a few different bylaws. Duglad and Heidi discussed which one was the most current set. Heidi will send out by-laws to the directors after the meeting.

Discussion of bylaws - Jim Corliss sent them to Ryan. Ryan forwarded them to the Directors after the meeting. Jim mentioned they were not voted on, they were suggestions. The most updated version is the 2016 version and those are on the website.

New Business -

Matt would like to suggest the Christmas Tree Journal. We can buy this for members, we would get 2 pages of news to put in it. Every member would have to get signed up through the organization. Each issue is \$5.75 with a start-up of \$200. \$2900.37 would be the total for 2025. It's a value ad for the members. This would be in addition to the newsletter.

Dugald said we raise the dues by \$22 or we find the money somewhere. Matt understands that we are already raising the dues to cover what we are already doing.

One director asked for some samples of the publication. Dugald described it as a glossy magazine with about 20-30 pages of good articles and good information. We have been down this road a long time ago, we used to get Christmas Trees Magazine. They didn't raise dues enough to cover it and eventually, we ran out of money to pay for it. Is anyone on this call getting this? It's a \$30 annual subscription.

Ryan - Thank you to Joanne for her service, very much appreciated.

Matt - Thank you, Ryan, for your tenure as President of the Association. The amount of work that you have done on the Executive Board was a lot to jump into and I truly appreciate you as someone who has become a friend and mentor of mine. Your ability to lead and I've been trying to take notes and I've been trying to grow. You will always have a seat at the table for as long as you'd like and as long as you a member. You truly are a special individual to this association. The association has grown significantly under your leadership. I hope I can keep it steady over the next two years.

AGCOM

It has been a very busy year 2024, for MCTA and AGCOM. The Agricultural Council of Maine (AGCOM) works all year long and as MCTA is a member of that organization, MCTA benefits from many actions that the Council works on for everyone's benefit.

There are hundreds of Legislative issues that AGCOM tracks for its members. Not all might be in the interest of Christmas trees, but when such issues come up that do involve Christmas trees and like products the Council does their very best to track them and report to the powers to be what the issues are and to assist whereever needed. So I'm listing some of the AGCOM's issues that have been at the forefront this year to the members of the association.

AGCOM (continued)

- Tax issues
- PFAF's (Water quality problems)
- MFT (MAINE FARMLAND TRUST) keeping an eye on farm land
- UME (University of Maine Extension) a source of disease and plant info.
- UME Soil quality at Maine Extension
- UME Plant pathology- testing and results

There are many other representatives from all walks of life that participate in helping AGCOM function and fulfill the purposes of the Council. Recently at a Council meeting, an interesting item came up that I want to pass on to all. <u>CoverMe.gov</u> is a health coverage that may be available to some new or young growers and I would encourage folks to check into it.

Maine Farmland Trust might be interesting for someone getting into farming. I want to highlight something that is done every two year by AGCOM--there is a legislative tour that is a one-day bus trip to a predetermined part of the state, which takes up to 70 Maine legislators to farms so they have a good idea what farming is really about. I have heard many good things about this bus tour and what an eye opener it is. In 2026 it will happen again and it would be great to see a Christmas tree farm on the itinerary.

Fryeburg Fair

The fair this year was a great success with 28 trees of various size and species and 30 wreaths. The display was really one of the best we have had in years and it showed as the public was very interested in both trees and wreaths with questions and attendance at the wreath demos. Sales of wreath supplies were very brisk after each demonstration.

Each day we had volunteers who worked the booth and sold supplies, seedlings and fielded questions about the tree business. Many people inquired as to how to start in the business along with joining the association. The first 3 days of the fair were very well attended and sales were great, but Wednesday and Thursday were quite slow affecting sales, Friday thru Sunday sales rebounded well.

The seedling sales were good, sales amounted to approximately 1300 plugs of balsam, fraser and blue spruce. The downside of the year is, there are about 200 plugs that didn't sell. I have the remaining plugs in containers and I will take care of them till next year, won't need to order quite so many next year. I'm considering cutting down on the order so we don't have a surplus at the end of the fair. The total sales amounted to \$4,209.00, which is good but I had to pay more this year for good plugs. I increased prices some but I didn't want to hurt sales. Next year I will have to order from Kelco for wire, soft touch rings and some misc. supplies, but nothing too much.

Access to plugs has become difficult, due to the time of year we need them. The growers don't ship until the fall and we need them in September. The grower I had this year has a very good product and will ship when we need them, but the price is \$1.70 ea. Shipping is included. In the past plugs have cost 40 to 50 cents plus shipping but that is in the past.

The Fair really spruced up our building there, some was repairs from storm damage and others were repairs I requested as they were needed due to age and wear. I feel we satisfied the Fair's expectations for the exhibit and

showed well in attendance and interest. The People's Choice voting really makes the point of interest by the public, as over 750 votes were cast for favorites in trees & wreaths.

I must say our volunteer workers did a fantastic job for us this year, before, during and at the close of the fair. We could not do it without them. Next year's fair will usher in a new era as the fair run will be 9 days instead of 8 that we are used to. There are lots of logistics to consider for the new fair plan, the board will have to put on their thinking caps. Last but very important, a huge thank you to the growers and wreath makers that really make this event happen year after year.

Seed Orchard Committee

<u>Norridgewock</u> - Prior to the fall MCTA meeting in North Berwick in September, Len and I met at the Norridgewock seed orchard with two members of the North Eastern Christmas Tree Research Alliance (NECTRA) in order to familiarize them with our seed orchard status (NECTRA is based in Atlantic Canada). We inspected the trees from the second round of grafted clones of the best 13 trees from the progeny testing of 20+/- years ago. The trees were in good condition. Our Canadian visitors were impressed with the number of years of growth with retained needles, being 5, 6, or 7 years of branch growth with needles retained along the branches. This is reported to be a good indicator of needle retention, with the more years of growth with live needles indicating better needle retention following harvest. We noted that there were many male flower buds on the lower branches, perhaps indicating that 2025 may be a good cone year. In 2023 we harvested 80 pounds of seed from this seed orchard's original trees.

Ashland - There was no visit to the Ashland seed orchard in 2024.

<u>Huff Hill, Hartland</u> - This new seed orchard planting site received a July application of 1000 lbs of Mag-lime as was recommended from the recent soil test report for the site. We also marked out the rows (25' apart) and the future planting spots (20' apart in rows), with 9 rows and 8 planting spots per row, using 4' wooden stakes and bright red flagging.

On August 21 Ron Lemin sprayed a 4' square at the planting spots with a glyphosate/simazine mixture which was checked 3 weeks later and had an acceptable kill rate of grasses and broad leaved weeds. In September the field was mowed by Matt Quinn. Total cost for spraying and mowing was 390(250 + 140).

28 seed orchard grafted (in June 2023) planting stock trees (1 died this summer) are being kept at Len Price's farm for out planting at this site in spring 2025. Additional potted root stock trees are also being stored there, for additional grafting in spring 2025. We anticipate receiving support in determining the appropriate grid layout of the grafted clones from the University of Maine for this seed orchard planting next spring.
